As Vice President of Adult Soccer for West Virginia Soccer, I am pleased to present the annual report on the status of adult soccer in our state. This report encompasses current league activities, upcoming tournaments, collaborative efforts with youth leagues, and insights into national trends in adult soccer.

Current Adult Soccer Leagues in West Virginia

Adult soccer in West Virginia continues to grow, with several leagues providing opportunities for players to engage in the sport. Notably, the Southern West Virginia Adult Soccer League currently comprises 10 teams competing at the Shawnee Sports Complex in Dunbar, West Virginia. Updates from US Adult Soccer

US adult soccer has made several changes to the process to streamline injury reporting for insurance claims. The process now seems to be easier than ever. The process can now be found at <https://usadultsoccer.com/player-injury-claim/>. If you have any questions about this process please reach out. Also a reminder that players under the age of 18 are no longer permitted to participate in adult leagues on teams with members older than 18. If you wish for this to then all the adults on that team would have to be safe sports certified. The likely hood of that happening is extremely low. So please keep this in mind when advertising age restrictions happen for your leagues.

Recent and Upcoming Regional, National, and International Changes

Selected and highlighted 2025/26 Modification to IFAB Laws of the Game Effective July 1, 2025

(For more details, including specific verbiage of these changes, see www.theifab.com)

- Updated guideline: Only the Captain can approach the Referee.
 - The emphasis of this protocol is on stopping players physically approaching the referee, as this can be very intimidating, especially when a number of players are involved and get very close to and/or surround the referee.
 - Creating a captain-only zone will focus responsibility on the captain to encourage their teammates to behave appropriately. The captain will be able to approach the referee but must take responsibility for helping ensure that their teammates respect the captain-only zone.
- Law 12 – Fouls and Misconduct: Goalkeeper holding the ball for too long.
 - A corner kick will be awarded to the opposing team when the goalkeeper controls the ball with their hand(s)/arm(s) for longer than eight seconds.

WV Referee Registration Overview




Figure 1. Cumulative WV referee attrition in Years 1 - 4 following initial license year

Notable Observations from 2024 Data:

- Referee attrition remains a concern (Fig. 1). **Only 30% of new referees return after their first year, and only 10% remain after 4 years** as match officials.
- The number of referees returning from the previous year improved as a percentage but remains significantly lower than the average for the five years before the COVID-19 pandemic—indeed, **22.8% lower than the average annual pre-COVID rate**.

- More than 30% of referees in West Virginia were 15 years old or younger in 2024, up from 24% the year before.
- Registration numbers in 2024 continued to recover from the pandemic years and ended with a 4% increase over 2022. However, WV referee registration in 2023 was still more than 10% lower than in the most recent year before the pandemic.

Notes:

- All the individuals found to have committed Referee Assault per U.S. Soccer Policy 531-9 received suspensions of three months, the standard sanction "for a minor or slight touching of the referee" per Policy 531-9.5(A)(1)(a).
- The coach was investigated for alleged Referee Abuse but was found not to be a rostered team official. Therefore, U.S. Soccer policy had no jurisdiction. The referee was coached to check team rosters before the match, and the league was informed that the coach was not properly credentialed.
- An allegation of Referee Assault against a referee licensed by West Virginia per U.S. Soccer Policy 531-9 was filed with a U.S. Soccer member organization outside of West Virginia at an out-of-state event. The out-of-state member organization convened a hearing panel to adjudicate the matter, and the alleged team official was found not guilty.



2024 WV Soccer Association Young Referees of the Year

Colin Petsko (Morgantown, WV) – Colin began playing soccer at a young age and became certified as a referee when he was 12. He has consistently demonstrated maturity well beyond what is typical for his age, allowing him to progress rapidly in his referee development. His passion for the game, as both a player and a referee, has given him a deep understanding of soccer. Since 2021, Colin has represented West Virginia in the Eastern Region National Championship Series. At just 14 years old in 2021, Colin earned a semifinal referee assignment in 2022; at 15, he served as the referee for the 13u boys Eastern Region Final. His abilities as a referee continued to be recognized in 2023 and 2024, with him earning semifinal (2023) and final (2024) assignments at the Eastern Region Championships. Colin has also been officiating adult matches during the summer, handling these games well and earning respect from a diverse group of adult players. He makes every effort to attend educational and training sessions, taking the information he receives back to share with other referees in his local area. Colin is very receptive to feedback from coaches, mentors, and fellow referees. He remains humble and consistently shows a desire to improve with every match he works. As a supportive and professional teammate, he demonstrates one of the best work rates in West Virginia. His maturity and confidence surpass most of his peers; however, what truly stands out is that his professionalism and work ethic do not change depending on the level of match he officiates. He brings the same qualities to a 10u amateur match as he does to an adult match. By combining his understanding of soccer with his strong work rate, Colin can effectively navigate the different levels of the game and adjust his management style to meet the specific needs of each match.



Lyndsay Cox (Kenna, WV) – Lyndsay has worked in many high-level, competitive matches, including the Shawnee Soccer League in Dunbar, West Virginia, which is a competitive and academy-level league, as well as tournaments in West Virginia, Virginia, Maryland, Ohio, and Tennessee. She officiated at the USYS Presidents Cup in 2024 and served as a volunteer field marshal for the 2022 Presidents Cup. She has successfully balanced her academics, personal goals, and officiating to demonstrate how a young person can be engaged in their community, set goals, and succeed at a young age. Lyndsay exhibits the best qualities of effort, initiative, enthusiasm, and integrity necessary to succeed as a young and developing referee. Her interest and commitment to learning and refining her skills are evident in the field when she is working. Her focus on her academics and clear path towards a successful adult career showcase how officiating can help develop essential life skills such as communication, teamwork, and decision-making. Ms. Cox consistently brings a level of maturity and professionalism to each assignment that is rare at this age.

Overall Update – 2025/2024 Current Cycle

- Peter McGahey continues to serve as Program Director and Amanda Eller continues to serve as Program Administrator. A positive and collaborative partnership that benefits our players, coaches, and state.
- Program is developing in a positive direction with 252 (98 girls & 154 boys) players registered to date.
- Continue with year 3 of program initiatives including expanding training calendar (beginning late fall for non-high school teams and adding training dates between winter events), combining age groups into two birth years (i.e. – 10/11 and 13/14) to enhance and expand player pools and reducing the need of out of state events for our youngest age group.
- Added a new and diverse group of coaches, representing areas across the state, to both Girls and Boys team through a fall application and interview process.
- Added Goalkeeper Coaching for both girls and boys age groups during each training session. Addressing a real area of need.
- Program initiatives include combining high school age groups into a High Age team for events.
- Continue to hold training sessions at Bridgeport facility. Bridgeport facility location with indoor and outdoor fields is a tremendous benefit to our program.
- Decision was made not to attend the NC friendlies this year due to time and cost for families. Held an additional training weekend.
- Plan was to attend the VA friendlies in February. Event was canceled due to weather. .
- Planning and preparing - upcoming events. May 9th and 10th, 2025 – Mini-Camp/ Shawnee Soccer Complex & June 6th, 7th, and 8th, 2025 – Regional Tournament / NJ & PA.
- 13/14 Boys Age Group Head Coach Ray Kryzak (Grassroots) & 12 Boys Age Group Head Coach Todd McClure (D License) have begun the US Soccer Coach Educator License Pathway.
- Peter McGahey, ODP Director, continues to serve as an Assistant Coach for the U.S. Soccer Power Soccer National Team.

Areas of Strength

- Amanda's leadership and experience with operations and administration. Execution of our administration operations is second to none. A real strength of the program.
- Dedicated, diverse, and committed coaching staff. Coaches' knowledge, commitment, and passion for WV ODP players are real positives. Coaches have been instrumental in continued and ongoing identification of players and enhancing our player pools.
- College Coaches for both the HS Girls and Boys age groups/teams.
- Committed and passionate players. Players play with joy and passion with a real commitment to improvement. Represent WV Soccer Association with pride.
- A work in process. ODP is not a competitor with the clubs. Players are our focus.

Areas of Focus/Growth

- Need to increase the overall number and quality of players within our player pools. Girls' side continues as a concern for the third year in a row. High school age groups are a new concern. Low numbers would have resulted in not taking all age groups to events due to the low numbers of players available. Other states are having a similar experience regardless of their size. Not a unique challenge for WV.

- ODP is not a competitor with the clubs. Players are our focus. Some club leadership is more receptive than others. Relationships and dialogue are building with clubs. This includes both technical and volunteer leadership, where applicable. A slow process. Need to collaborate - examples to avoid scheduling conflicts, aid with player identification, etc.
- Examination of programming and calendars moving forward. What's going to work best for each age group - Example. U12 & U14 (non-high school) & high school age groups may need different programming and calendars. May not stop programming for older age groups and focus on younger age groups with more resources. Need to expanded collaboration with surrounding states, etc.
- Continuing to grow and expand Coaching Staff. Identification of the right people will be key to our continued growth. Finding the best mechanisms for this process. One mechanism that is needed for staff identification is offering expanding coach education opportunities with the D License and C License courses.
- Continued consistent communication and messaging about ODP's mission and purpose, where and how it fits for our top WV players and their development pathway. Improved organization and messaging help with player retention, player and staff recruitment, and overall execution of programs.

Assistance Needed

- Positive Ambassadors of the Program. Everyone needs to be communicating the benefits of our program.
- Sponsorship. Additional revenues available for program enhancements. Player training costs have remained the same this year. It is unlikely that this will be the case in 2025 due to rising costs. Event fees have been adjusted upwards slightly to reflect increases in costs (fuel, hotels, event fees, etc.). Player training fee costs need to remain 'low' to remove a barrier to entry into our ODP program.
- Lack of communication for the Region is a major problem. Despite being asked repeatedly to include Amanda in communications, she has yet to be added to region wide communications. This creates a perception of disengagement from WV; which couldn't be farther from the truth. We want and need to be involved or at least up to speed with administrative communications from the Region.
- Lack of clear communication and leadership from US Youth Soccer at both the National and Regional Level. Regional Level is of particular concern. To date there has been zero communication from Regional Coaches regarding regional programming and identification processes. What's the summer plan – we don't know. This is broken record with the Region. All administrative focus with tournament being the focus. No technical direction.
- Lack of clarity and leadership around the Regional Summer tournament. Unclear that the best interest of the ODP program, our players and their development are the focus. Appears to be an afterthought with main details being railroaded by a few loud voices. Keep running the tournament. Hit repeat and do it again. Zero conversations around initiatives or growth.

WVSA Policies and Procedures Youth Registration

Policy Change submitted by the Shawnee Soccer Recreational Academy (SSRA) and the Putnam United FC Recreational Academy (PUFCRA)

Present Policy

7.1.1.8.4 Academy Programs

1. Member clubs may offer an academy program train younger players, U8, U10, and U12.
2. Academy teams may play friendly matches against other academy teams and in the WVSA Open Cup Academy Division.
3. Any recreation players that participate in an academy program will be subject to the same rules as All-Star players for Kohls Cup.
4. Academy players must be rostered on an academy roster in the WVSA / YLUSA system.

Proposed Policy

7.1.1.8.4 Academy Programs

1. Member clubs may offer an academy program. These programs are designed to offer players additional training, matches, and tournament opportunities.
2. WVSA membership rules may allow the formation of additional academy programs subject to the rules of procedure for nominating and approving membership.
3. Academy programs are subject to the same WVSA rules as other recreational programs regarding eligibility, registration, coach certifications, and rosters.
4. Academy teams may play friendly matches against recreational, academy, or competitive teams at age level subject to WVSA rules.
5. Academy teams may participate in the recreational division of WVSA-sponsored competitions subject to the same roster restrictions as recreational teams for players designated as competitive.

What effect would change on this policy?:

The purpose of this request is to broaden the field of eligibility for players wanting to participate in Academy programs that provide more training and development for players without changing their status from a recreational division player. Expanding the participant pool to all age levels encourages innovation and promotes more soccer opportunities within the State.

CHAPTER FOUR

1 APPEALS AND DISCIPLINE PROCEDURE

4.1 RIGHTS OF APPEAL:

All individual and organization members of WVSA have the right to appeal any finding against them, in accordance with USSF bylaws, policies and requirements prior to any suspension-taking place. Excluding, in the case of suspension prior to a hearing, referee assault, USYS rule 4043 and red card match minimum suspensions. All WVSA members have full rights as granted by the USSF at all levels of this process.

4.1.1 Appeal procedures: all appeals must be submitted to the WVSA office with a postmark date of no more than 5 business days from the date of the receipt of the decision against them.

4.1.1.1 Fees shall be set by the Board of Directors

4.1.1.2 all appeals shall be submitted on the form provided.

4.1.1.3 Persons claiming the right of an expedited hearing under USSF rules must contact the WVSA immediately.

4.1.1.4 The chair of the Appeals & Discipline committee shall schedule a hearing at a time and place convenient to the appellant.

4.1.1.5.1 The hearing shall be held no later than 20 business days from the date that the appeal notice was received by WVSA.

4.1.1.6 All procedures and policies for appeals hearings shall be set by the Appeals & Discipline committee and approved by the Board of Directors and shall be compliance with USSF. All parties to an appeal must receive these procedures and policies with the hearing notice.

4.1.1.7 Decisions of the Appeals & Discipline committee may be appealed to USSF. All parties to an appeal must receive their rights to appeal with the decision letter.

4.1.1.8 All decisions at all levels shall stand until overturned or unless a higher authority orders a stay.

4.1.2 Jurisdiction: any decision by any member association may be appealed to the WVSA Appeals & Discipline committee. Decisions by WVSA youth or amateur divisions, cup, ODP and referee committee may be appealed to the WVSA Appeals & Discipline committee.

4.1.2.1 A decision by a WVSA team, club or other organization may be appealed to no more than one level below WVSA.

4.1.2.2 No more than 20 business days may be taken for the lower level appeal.

4.1.2.3 Any appeal not heard or decision not given within 20 business days from the date the appeal was received shall immediately go to the WVSA Appeals & Discipline committee.

4.1.2.4 All WVSA members and committees may set the procedures for appeal hearings but all procedures must comply with USSF and WVSA bylaws, policies and requirements.

4.1.2.5 All those under the jurisdiction of WVSA and its members must exhaust all remedies with WVSA and USSF prior to invoking the aid of the courts.

4.2 DISCIPLINE

All WVSA member associations are charged with the responsibility of seeing that these rules are distributed to every youth and amateur player, coach, team staff member, administrator and referee. Parents of youth players and spectators should be made aware of these rules.

4.2.1 Authority

All members and participants in WVSA programs have requested to participate in WVSA programs. Therefore, these participants have agreed to abide by the constitution, bylaws, policies, procedures, rules and regulations of Fifa, us soccer, USYSA and or USASA, WVSA and all member clubs and leagues.

4.2.1.2 all WVSA member associations, clubs and leagues are directed to form their own Appeals & Discipline committee and to hold hearings, per us soccer and WVSA rules, on all persons named in a misconduct report. except for cases of referee assault and abuse which should be forwarded to WVSA. Special care should be given to reports on misconduct by coaches, team staff and spectators. Violent conduct by anyone should be referred to the WVSA office. Cases of multiple red cards or

excessive yellow cards by players, coaches and or team staff should also be reported to the appropriate Appeals & Discipline committee and or div up.

4.2.1.3 The WVSA division Vice President shall have authority over all members in their respective programs and shall investigate all reports of misconduct and refer action to the WVSA Appeals & Discipline committee the local club or league or the WVSA cup programs. (4/94)

4.2.1.4 Any coach or team staff member participating in a match while under suspension or allowing a player to participate while under suspension shall be reported to the division Vice President. (4/94)

4.2.1.4.1 Any coach and or team staff member found guilty of playing an ineligible player or participating while under suspension shall be subject to a minimum suspension of 1 year for each offense. (4/94)

4.2.1.4.1 Any player found guilty of participating in a match while under suspension shall be subject to a minimum suspension of 1 year for each offense. (4/94)

4.2.1.4.2 Local clubs or leagues or WVSA may require that the player or coaches pass of a suspended member be returned. Any person not turning in a pass as requested may be subject to discipline by the club, league or WVSA. In cases of suspensions that do not cover all soccer activities, WVSA office will work with all parties to enable the member to participate at the appropriate level.

4.2.2 Misconduct of Players / Coaches / Assistant Coaches

4.2.2.1 Any player, coach, or other team staff member receiving a red card or ejection shall receive the following minimum sanctions:

1. First offense - one game suspension
2. Second offense - two game suspension
3. Third offense - three game suspension plus mandatory inquiry by division Vice President and state Appeals & Discipline hearing. (6/96)

***** The above are minimums. Nothing herein prevents a member association from enacting more severe sanctions after providing each person a hearing in accordance with WVSA/ US SOCCER RULES.

4.2.2.1.1 Suspensions under the above rule shall be in

Effect for all WVSA sanctioned games and Tournaments and for any out of state event attended with permission. (11/96)

4.2.2.1.2 Match suspensions shall be served at the next

regularly scheduled match of the team whose match the card was received, at the same level of play. (11/96)

- A. League games - next league match
- B. Tournament game - next tournament game
- C. Cup game - next cup game
- D. Snickers cup game - next snickers cup game
- E. Any other match - next team match
- F. Any outstanding match suspensions must be served before playing in any WVSA cup game. *

• Exception any snickers cup match suspension may only be served at a snickers cup match.

4.2.2.1.2.1 Regularly scheduled means prior to the match in

which the red card was received. (6/97)

4.2.2.1.2.1.2 Exceptions for a match not scheduled prior to the red card being given

may only be granted by the division VP. (6/97)

4.2.2.2 Any misconduct by a player coach or other team staff member that is reported by the referee or other person appointed per us soccer policy 3041 2.1, a, b, c, shall be directed to the SRA, the division Vice President, and the local club or Vice President of programs as applicable

4.2.2.2.1 All game suspensions must be reported to the WVSA office. When an ejection or game suspension is issued to a player, the responsible authority shall forward a copy of the referee's report or action of the hearing board to the WVSA office.

4.2.2.2.2 The SRA and the division Vice President shall compile all reports and investigate the report and may give the results of their investigation to the Appeals & Discipline committee, the local club or league or the Vice President programs for action.

4.2.2.3 Violent conduct by any player, coach and or other team staff member during a match and violence toward any person or property after a match shall be reported to the WVSA office and handled per 4.2.2.2.

4.2.2.4 Member associations, WVSA programs and divisions are given the authority to enact penalties for yellow and red card accumulation.

4.2.2.5 Any action taken under 4.2.2, other than the minimum penalties in 4.2.2.1 requires a prior hearing per US soccer rules

4.2.3 Misconduct of spectators

4.2.3.1 Each team, club and league (youth or amateur) is responsible for the conduct of its spectators. Therefore, the coach and or team staff is expected to control the team's spectators.

4.2.3.2 The local club or league or WVSA program shall take action against any identifiable spectator that is guilty of misconduct.

4.2.3.3 Reports of misconduct by spectators and reports of any action taken by the club or league or WVSA program shall be forwarded to the WVSA office.

4.2.4 Misconduct by teams

4.2.4.1 The WVSA will not hesitate to deny teams within its jurisdiction the privilege of participation in all or selected activates for repeated offenses and for a serious offense considered to bring the game into disrepute.

4.2.4.2 Local leagues or WVSA programs that are concerned about a particular team's conduct should contact the div Vice President.

4.2.4.3 The division of Vice President shall investigate the matter and make a report to the WVSA Appeals & Discipline committee. Who shall then hold a hearing prior to any action being taken?

4.2.5 Games directly sponsored by WVSA

Misconduct by any participant or spectator in a match, tournament or event directly sponsored by WVSA shall be reported to the appropriate WVSA committee. The committee shall take action per WVSA and competition rules. The Vice President programs shall report any action taken to the appropriate div Vice President. The WVSA Appeals & Discipline committee will hear any cases needing further action.

4.2.6 Misconduct toward officials

4.2.6.1 WVSA has exclusive jurisdiction over assault and abuse of soccer officials as defined by USSF policies **531-9**

4.2.6.2 When assault, abuse or **Gross Misconduct toward** officials has been alleged a report will be forwarded by the referee, and the match organizers to the WVSA office, the SRA and the appropriate division Vice President

4.2.6.3 The report shall be investigated by the div Vice President and the SRA and all WVSA members are directed to cooperate in the investigation.

4.2.6.3.1 If it shall be determined, by SRA and division of the Vice President, that referee assault or abuse may have occurred per USSF policies then the matter shall be given to the WVSA Appeals & Discipline committee for action. Such determination shall be delivered in writing to the accused and the WVSA office.

4.2.6.3.1 Once the determination has been made the accused may be suspended pending a hearing, which must occur within 30 days per USSF policies.

4.2.6.3.1.1 The person that has been charged with referee assault shall be suspended pending a hearing per USSF policies.

4.2.6.3.1.2 All persons charged under this rule shall be given a copy of the USSF policies and WVSA hearing procedures.

4.2.6.3.1.3 Any person found guilty of referee assault may appeal to the USSF appeals committee.

4.2.6.3.2 If it shall be determined that referee abuse may have been committed the matter will be referred to the division Vice President **for investigation**.

4.2.6.3.2.1 **If a hearing is needed** it shall be carried out following USSF and WVSA rules.

4.2.6.3.2.2 Any person found guilty of referee abuse may appeal to the **USSF Appeals Committee**.

4.2.6.3.3 If it shall be determined that **Gross Misconduct** **may** have been committed the matter will be referred to the division Vice President **for investigation**..

4.2.6.3.3.1 **If a hearing is needed** it shall be carried out following USSF and WVSA rules.

4.2.6.3.3.2 Any person found guilty of this offense may appeal per WVSA rules.

US Soccer Policy 531-9 and penalty Matrix ((INSERT)

4.2.7 Misconduct of referees

4.2.7.1 When a referee is alleged to have committed misconduct, per USSF policy 539-10, toward any participant or spectator in a match or in his or her conduct as a member of the WVSA and USSF referee program, a report will be filed with the SRA.

4.2.7.2 The report shall be investigated by the SRA.

4.2.7.3 The SRA may bring the report and the results of the Investigation to the referee committee for a hearing per USSF 539-10.

4.3.12.1 A hearing will be conducted under WVSA and USSF policies.

4.3.12.2 Any person found guilty under this rule may be disciplined per USSF 539-10.

4.3.12.3 Any person found guilty may appeal to the WVSA Appeals & Discipline committee.

4.4 Hearings at club, league or WVSA level

4.4.12 A disciplinary hearing is a meeting to determine whether disciplinary action is required for an incident that occurred within the confines of a game, practice or other event. All parties named in the incident are entitled to participate.

4.4.13 A protest hearing is a meeting to determine whether there has been a violation of the rules of the club, league or WVSA or if a misapplication of the laws of the game occurred during a game.

4.4.14 An ethics hearing is a meeting to determine whether there has been a breach of ethics, a violation of administrative rules or a legitimate grievance filed against a member of WVSA (coach, player, parent, or club official).

4.4.14.1 Form a standing committee at the beginning of each seasonal year

4.4.14.2 Appoint of a chairperson from the board of directors or a suitable candidate from the membership (your by-laws may specify this appointment.)

4.4.14.3 Appoint a minimum of three (3) additional members from within your league.

4.4.14.4 All members should be selected based on integrity and ethics, not necessarily knowledge of the game and its laws.

4.4.14.5 It is strongly recommended that a licensed referee instructor be available to the committee to answer any questions on the laws of the game, mechanics and current interpretations of the laws of the game.

4.4.14.6 All hearing panels or committees shall have at least three members including a chair. They shall be drawn from the membership of the committee or may be appointed on a case by case basis as needed and provided for by the bylaws or rules.

4.3 .5 Due process

In order to satisfy the requirements of due process, all individuals who are reported for violations that may result in sanctions must be offered the opportunity to request an in person hearing and to have an advisor present at that hearing. A copy of USSF bylaw 701 and your hearing procedures must be included in the letter of notification (see appendix 9 for USSF bylaw 701 and appendix 8 for WWSA hearing procedures).

4.3.12 Meeting Methods

4.3..6.1 Meetings should take place at a time, place convenient to the defendant.

4.3.6.2 Meetings are open to participants, witnesses and advisors

4.3.13 Contacting the parties involved.

4.3.7.1 Direct contact may be made by telephone, certified mail, or by personal contact.

4.3.7.2 All parties involved must be directly contacted.

4.3.12.1 Witnesses speaking on behalf of the parties need not be contacted by the league, but by the parties themselves.

4.3.13 Contents of the notice of hearing (see appendix 1)

4.3.8.1 State the **subject** of the disciplinary hearing.

4.3.8.2 State **date, time, and location** of hearing

4.3.8.3 Precisely cite the rules violation and possible sanctions.

4.3.8.4 State the consequences of failure to attend the hearing by citing the exact length of suspension likely to be determined in the individual's absence.

4.3.8.5 Provide a telephone number or email address to contact chairperson if necessary prior to hearing.

4.3.8.6 State and cite the WWSA, USYSA, USASA or USSF rule violated..

4.3.8.7 Parties must be provided with all information available at the time the notice is given and written allegations against them prior to the hearing.

4.3.8.8 USSF bylaw 701

4.3.8.9 Hearing procedures.

4.3.9 Hearing order (all statements must be directed to the committee and not to the other participants)

4.3.9.1 Introduction of chairperson and committee members.

4.3.9.2 Introduction of evidence and allegations by chairperson.

4.3.12.1 Statement by first party.

4.3.12.2 Witness statements.

4.3.12.3 Statements by second party (if there are two parties)

4.3.12.4 Witness statements.

4.3.12.5 Questions by disciplinary committee members.

4.3.12.6 Concluding statements by all parties.

4.3.10 Handling of witness

4.3.10.1 Do not permit parties to speak directly to each other.

4.3.10.2 Have all minors accompanied by an adult.

4.3.11 Concluding the hearing

4.3.11.1 Explain in detail that decisions are made based on a vote of committee members.

4.3.12.1 Explain in detail what suspensions and sanctions may be or are proscribed by WWSA.

4.3.12.2 Give firm dates of notification in writing.

4.3.12.3 Detail whether parties are suspended pending notification. In referee assault only.

4.3.13 Written notification of decision (see appendix 2)

4.3.13.1 Reiterate allegations.

4.3.13.2 State date, location and time that hearing was held.

4.3.13.3 Detail names of parties involved. **It is not necessary to provide addresses and phone numbers of witnesses.**

4.3.13.4 Explain the decision of the committee providing ample detail used in the decision making process.

4.3.13.5 Explain in detail the terms of any sanction decided upon by the committee.

- 4.3.13.6 Explain in detail the methods of carrying out the above sanction.
- 4.3.13.7 Include information on how to appeal this decision. (See appendix 3)
- 4.3.13.8 Send copy of this notification to WVSA**
- 4.3.13.9 Send decision by certified mail.**

4.4 Appeals

Any decision from a league discipline and protest committee can be appealed. The first avenue of appeal is to the WVSA Appeals and Disciplinary Committee. A check for appropriate fee must accompany the written appeal and be received into the WVSA office within five (5) business days of the original decision by your league (see appendix 3 for the WVSA appeals form).

All sanctions and suspensions continue during the appeals process.

4.5 League instructions on misconduct toward game officials

All cases of referee abuse or assault should be reported to WVSA within 24 hours. These situations must not be handled as a league issue.

What is assault?

USSF Policy 531-9 reads the following:

Referee assault is an intentional act of physical violence at or upon a referee. Assault includes, but is not limited to the following acts committed upon a referee; hitting, kicking, punching, chocking, spitting at, or on, grabbing or bodily running into a referee; head butting; the act of kicking or throwing any object at a referee that could inflict injury; damaging the referee's uniform or personal property, i.e. car, equipment, etc .

What is abuse?

USSF Policy 531-9 reads the following:

Referee abuse is a verbal statement or physical act not resulting in bodily contact, which implies or threatens physical harm to a referee or the referee's property or equipment.

Abuse includes, but is not limited to the following acts committed upon a referee: using foul or abusive language toward a referee; spewing any beverage on a referee's personal property; or verbally threatening a referee.

Verbal threats are remarks that carry the implied or direct threat of physical harm. Such remarks as "I'll get you after the game" or "you wouldn't get out of here in one piece" shall be deemed referee abuse.

What is Gross Misconduct?

These situations are deemed extremely serious. These are not league issues... report them immediately to:

Suggested addition to the Open Transfer Rule 3/22/2025

3.10.3.4 There shall be an open transfer period (**s**) for all age groups as determined by the WVSA BOD, during each seasonal year. During this open transfer period, a player, at his or her option, shall be released from their Youth Contract and automatically transfer from one WVSA Club to another WVSA club after obtaining a release. So long as a player requests a release and transfer during the open period, WVSA is permitted to complete that transfer process after the conclusion of the open period.

3.10.3.4.1 The Open Transfer Period is not an Open Tryout Period. Section 3.10.4 shall be in effect.

Code of Conduct Policy

Section 101. Introduction, Purpose, and Applicability

- (a) The Code of Conduct Policy of US Youth Soccer establishes the ethical standards for governance and committee volunteers and staff of US Youth Soccer (collectively referred to as “Representatives”) in addition to all members and participants within any and all sanctioned programs, events, activities and competitions.
- (b) The Code of Conduct Policy applies to all staff, volunteers, members and participants who are involved or engage with any sanctioned US Youth Soccer program, event, activity or competition.
- (c) The purposes of the Code of Conduct Policy is to provide evidence of US Youth Soccer’s commitment to the lawful and ethical conduct of its Representatives, members and participants and to protect those who report violations of the Code of Conduct Policy consistent with US Youth Soccer’s Whistleblower Policy.
- (d) The Code of Conduct Policy is intended to supplement but not replace any applicable state or federal laws governing behavior.
- (e) Representatives, members and participants must respect and comply with US Youth Soccer rules and regulations, observe high standards of conduct, and participate in establishing and maintaining such high standards.

Section 102. Zero Tolerance

- (a) US Youth Soccer maintains a zero tolerance regarding abuse.
- (b) The US Youth Soccer Zero Tolerance for abuse extends to all representatives, members and participants in any and all US Youth Soccer sanctioned programs, events, activities and competitions.
- (c) US Youth Soccer requires every representative, coach and volunteer to assist in creating a safe environment for participants at and during any and all sanctioned US Youth Soccer programs, events, activities and competitions.

Section 103. Prohibited Substances

- (a) US Youth Soccer prohibits the use and possession of illegal drugs, alcohol, or, in the case of minors, tobacco for any and all coaches and participants at any and all sanctioned programs, events, activities and competitions.

Section 104. Prohibited Activities and Sexual Misconduct

- (a) US Youth Soccer prohibits nudity and any indecent exposure by any representative, member or participant at any sanctioned programs, events, activities and competitions.
 - 1. An example of prohibited physical contact include a coach asking a minor athlete to sit in their lap or cuddling during training or while on an overnight trip.
- (b) US Youth Soccer prohibits any representative, member or participant from engaging in sexually oriented conversations at any sanctioned programs, events, activities and competitions. This includes sharing information about one’s own personal relationships, dating or sexual activities.
- (c) US Youth Soccer prohibits the possession of any sexually oriented materials to include magazines and videos while participating at any sanctioned program, event, activity and competition.

Section 105. Physical, Verbal and Emotional Misconduct

(a) The following definitions describe the prohibited conduct for this section:

1. **Physical Misconduct** - any interaction with another person that inflicts physical injury upon another person or reasonably threatens to cause physical injury to another person. Physical Misconduct does not include professionally accepted (in youth soccer) coaching methods of skill enhancement, physical conditioning, team building, appropriate discipline, inspiring motivation, or improved athlete performance. Appropriate physical contact occurs in public when contact is designed for the benefit of the athlete and does not meet an emotional or other need of an adult, and free of potentially creating a physical or sexual intimacy. US Youth Soccer prohibits representatives, members and participants from engaging in any other form of physical contact with and or between athletes.
2. **Verbal Misconduct** - any objectively inappropriate use of language aimed at another person that a reasonable person would find degrading or threatening.
3. **Emotional Misconduct** - any conduct that is objectively and reasonably deemed to have caused harm to another person's psychological or intellectual functioning, which may be exhibited by emotional damage such as severe anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or aggression. When an act qualifies as Emotional Misconduct is determined objectively, and not whether harm is intended or results from the behaviors. Emotional Misconduct includes, but is not limited to
 - a) Verbal Acts: any acts that involve repeated and excessive verbal assaults or attacks against someone personally in a manner that serves no productive training or motivational purpose.
 - b) Physical Acts: any acts that involve repeated and/or severe physically aggressive behaviors, including but not limited to, throwing sport equipment, water bottles or chairs at or in the presence of others, punching walls, windows or other objects.
 - c) Acts that Deny Attention or Support: any acts that involve ignoring or isolating a person for extended periods of time, including routinely or arbitrarily excluding an athlete from practice.
 - d) Criminal Conduct: Any act or conduct described as emotional abuse or misconduct under federal or state law (e.g. child abuse, child neglect) would be considered a type of impermissible Emotional Misconduct under this Policy.
 - e) Stalking: Stalking occurs when a person purposefully engages in a course of conduct directed at a specific person, and knows or should know, that the course of conduct would cause a reasonable person to (i) fear for their safety, (ii) fear for the safety of a third person, or (iii) experience substantial emotional distress. "Course of conduct" means at least two or more acts in which a person directly, indirectly, or through third parties, by any action, method, device, or means, follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about another person, or interferes with another person's property. "Substantial emotional distress" means significant mental suffering or anguish. Stalking also includes "cyber-stalking," wherein a person stalks another using electronic media,

such as the internet, social media networks, blogs, cell phones, texts, or other similar devices or forms of contact.

Section 106. One-on-One Interactions

(a) Observable and interruptible

1. One-on-One interactions between minors and an adult (who is not the minor's legal guardian) are permitted if they occur at an observable and interruptible distance by another adult.
2. Isolated, one-on-one interactions between minors and an adult (who is not the minor's legal guardian) is prohibited, except under emergency circumstances.

(b) Meetings

1. Meetings between adults and minors may only occur if another adult is present, except under emergency circumstances. Such meetings must occur where interactions can be easily observed and at an interruptible distance from another adult.
2. If a one-on-one meeting takes place in an office, the door to the office must remain unlocked and open. If available, it will occur in an office that (if available) has windows, with the windows, blinds, and/or curtains remaining open during the meeting.

(c) Individual training sessions

1. Individual training sessions between adults and minors are permitted if the training session is observable and interruptible by another adult. The adult must obtain the written permission of the minor's legal guardian in advance of the individual training session. Parents, guardians, and other caretakers must be allowed to observe the training session. Permission for individual training sessions must be obtained at least every six months.

Section 107. Massages and rubdowns

(a) Licensed, certified professional

1. Any massage or rubdown performed by an adult on a minor athlete is prohibited unless such adult is a licensed massage therapist.
2. Any massage or rubdown by a licensed professional must be conducted in open and interruptible locations. Any massage of a minor athlete must be done with at least one other adult present and must never be done with only the minor athlete and licensed massage therapist in the room.
3. Even if the coach is a licensed massage therapist, the coach shall not perform a rubdown or massage of an athlete under any circumstances.

Section 108. Locker rooms, rest rooms and changing areas

(a) Use of recording devices

1. Use of any device's (including a cell phone's) recording capabilities, including voice recording, still cameras and video cameras in locker rooms, rest rooms, changing areas, or similar spaces is prohibited. Exceptions may be made for media and championship celebrations, provided that such expectations are approved in advance and two or more adults are present.

(b) Undress

1. Under no circumstances shall an unrelated adult be undressed (disrobed or partial or full nudity where private body parts are exposed) in front of minor athletes.

(c) Isolated one-on-one interactions

1. At no time are unrelated adults permitted to be alone with a minor in a locker room, rest room, or changing area except under emergency circumstances.

(d) Monitoring

1. US Youth Soccer regularly and randomly monitors the use of locker rooms, rest rooms and changing areas at facilities under our jurisdiction to ensure compliance with these policies.

(e) Safe spaces

1. Every effort should be made to provide private changing spaces for any youth that requests such an accommodation.

(f) Non-exclusive facility

1. If US Youth Soccer uses a facility not under our jurisdiction (for, e.g., training or competition or similar events) and the facility is used by multiple constituents, adults are nonetheless required to adhere to the rules set forth here.

Section 109. Social media and electronic communications

(a) Content

1. “Social Media Misconduct” is the use of rumors or false statements about someone to diminish that person’s reputation using electronic communications. It includes, but is not limited to, the use of social media or other technology to harass, frighten, intimidate, humiliate and/or socially exclude someone, and/or asking others to do the same.
2. All electronic communication originating from participating adults to amateur athletes who are minors must be professional in nature and should generally be group-based and should always be readily available to share with the athlete’s family, the Club, and USYS.

(b) Open and transparent

1. If a participating adult needs to communicate directly with an amateur athlete who is a minor via electronic communications, another participating adult or the minor’s legal guardian will be copied.
2. If a minor athlete communicates to the participating adult privately first, then the participating adult should respond to the minor athlete with a copy to another participating adult or the minor’s legal guardian.
3. A participating adult communicating electronically to the entire team will copy another participating adult.
4. Amateur athletes who are minors may “friend” the organization’s official page.

(c) Prohibited electronic communications

1. Participating adults are not permitted to communicate privately via electronic communications with amateur athletes who are minors, except under emergency circumstances.
2. Participating adults are not permitted to “private message,” “instant message,” “direct message”, or send photos via Snapchat or Instagram to a minor athlete privately.

3. Participating adults are not permitted to maintain social media connections with minors; such adults are not permitted to accept new personal page requests on social media platforms from amateur athletes who are minors and existing social media connections with amateur athletes who are minors shall be discontinued.

(d) Request to discontinue

1. Legal guardians may request in writing that their child not be contacted through any form of electronic communication by the organization or by the organization's participating adults. The organization will abide by any such request that their child not be contacted via electronic communication, absent emergency circumstances.

Section 110. Local travel

(a) Transportation

1. US Youth Soccer does not arrange for local travel.
2. Participating adults who are not also acting as a legal guardian, shall not ride in a vehicle alone with an unrelated athlete who is a minor, absent emergency circumstances, and may only drive with at least two other minor athletes or another adult at all times, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the minor athlete's parent/legal guardian in advance of each local travel.

Section 111. Team travel

(a) Team/competition travel

1. When only one participating adult and one minor athlete travel to a competition, the

(b) minor athlete must have his/her legal guardian's written permission in advance and for each competition to travel alone with the participating adult.

(c) Hotel rooms

1. Participating adults shall not share a hotel room or other sleeping arrangement with a minor athlete (unless the participating adult is the legal guardian, sibling, or is otherwise related to the minor athlete).

(d) Meetings

1. Meetings shall be conducted consistent with US Youth Soccer's policy for one-on-one interactions – i.e., any such meeting shall be observable and interruptible.
2. Meetings shall not be conducted in a hotel room.

Section 112. Bullying

(a) US Youth Soccer prohibits representatives, members and participants from engaging in any unwanted physical, verbal, social, sexual or criminal behaviors that are:

1. aggressive
2. directed at another person, and
3. intended to or causing to intimidate, hurt, control, or diminish the other person emotionally, physically or sexually.

Section 113. Harassment

(a) US Youth Soccer prohibits representatives, members and participants from engaging in any repeated and/or severe conduct that:

1. Causes fear, humiliation or annoyance.
2. Offends or degrades.
3. Creates a Hostile Environment (as defined herein)
4. Reflects discriminatory bias in an attempt to establish dominance, superiority or power over an individual or group based on gender, age, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity/expression, religion, national origin, or mental or physical disability; any act or conduct described as harassment under federal or state law.

(b) Conduct may not rise to the level of Harassment if it is:

1. Inadvertently saying or doing something hurtful.
2. Purposefully saying or doing something hurtful, but not as part of a pattern of behavior.
3. Arising from conflict or struggle between persons who perceive they have incompatible views and/or positions.

(c) A “Hostile Environment” exists when the conduct is sufficiently severe, persistent, and/or pervasive such that it interferes with, limits, or deprives any individual of the opportunity to participate in any Covered Program or activity. Conduct must be deemed severe, persistent, or pervasive from both a subjective and objective perspective. A Hostile Environment can be created by persistent or pervasive conduct or by a single or isolated incident that is sufficiently severe. The more severe the conduct, the less need there is to show a repetitive series of incidents to prove a Hostile Environment, particularly if the conduct is physical. A single incident of sexual contact, for example, may be sufficiently severe to constitute a Hostile Environment. In contrast, the perceived offensiveness of a single verbal or written expression, standing alone, is typically not sufficient to constitute a Hostile Environment. Whether a Hostile Environment exists depends on the totality of known circumstances, including, but not limited to:

1. Severity of the conduct.
2. Whether the conduct was physically threatening.
3. The effect of the conduct on the victim’s mental or emotional state.
4. Whether the conduct was directed at more than one person.
5. Whether the conduct arose in the context of other discriminatory conduct.
6. Whether the conduct unreasonably interfered with any person’s participation in sports, education or work programs or activities.
7. Whether the conduct implicates concerns related to protected speech.

Section 114. Hazing

(a) US Youth Soccer US Youth Soccer prohibits representatives, members and participants from engaging in any activity that could be defined as hazing at any sanctioned program, event, activity or competition.

Section 115. Mandatory Reporting

(a) US Youth Soccer requires all representatives, members and participants to immediately report any violations or suspected violations of the US Youth Soccer Code of Conduct Policy during any sanctioned programs, events, activities and competitions to a team

official, sanctioned program, event, activity or competition official or US Youth Soccer representative.

- (b) US Youth Soccer takes any and all reports of inappropriate behavior or suspicions of abuse seriously.
- (c) US Youth Soccer complies with all laws requiring a person to make a report to appropriate law enforcement agencies and requires all representatives, members and participants to either notify an official as indicated in Section 115. a. or report directly to law enforcement authorities.
- (d) Retaliation against individuals making good faith reports of misconduct is expressly prohibited.
