



- Help individuals develop their own unique strengths
- Encourage players to take control of their own development



BELONGING

- Help players feel secure, accepted, and respected
- Encourage positive relationships between teammates
- Provide players with a clear role and task within the team

DEVELOPMENT

- Recognize each player will have their own unique learning journey
- Help each individual to develop the skills and confidence to progress in the game
- Encourage an attitude of learning, confidence, and self-awareness







HIGH INTEREST IN LEARNING

- More than 90% spend some time each month on development
- 3 out of 4 coaches pursue learning opportunities outside of formal courses



ACCESSIBILITY CONSTRAINTS

- Time required, cost, and travel are persistent barriers to participate in further learning
- More than 50% interested in easier access to license courses



LEARNING ON SOCCER & PEOPLE ASPECTS

- Particular interest in real-world opportunities, peer-to-peer learning and access to informal learning
- Demand for learning on game understanding, technical development, training design and player-centered development



The **nine 101 Guides** introduce different forms of disability soccer, highlighting their rules, pathways, and ways to support inclusion for players and communities involved

Completed a full **committee-wide current state audit** of all resources in our ecosystem to identify gaps

During the USWNT games in Denver and Hartford, the DSC hosted on-field **honorees**, a blind soccer **demo**, **ASL chants** and **Alumni Meet + Grets** engaging fans and raising awareness for disability soccer



By the end of 2025, the DSC will publish a **funding guide** that will list grants available to all DSOs as well as templates for grant submissions





SafeSport for Licensed Coaches



U.S. Soccer SafeSport Update

Starting **December 2025**, U.S. Soccer will centrally manage SafeSport compliance for all Licensed Coaches through the U.S. Soccer Learning Center.

Why This Matters

- Simplifies Administration**
No more tracking or collecting proof locally.
- Ensures National Consistency**
Compliance managed in one place.
- Reduces Costs**
Fewer local compliance expenses.

How the New System Works

- Training Completion**
Coaches complete or link SafeSport training in the Learning Center.
- Automatic Tracking**
Compliance is tracked automatically.
- License Status**
Out-of-compliance licenses display as "Suspended."
- Free Access**
SafeSport training remains free via the Safe Soccer Clearance platform.



What Member Organizations Should Do

Help spread the word! Share this update with your clubs, leagues, and licensed coaches.

SafeSport Requirement for Licensed Coaches

U.S. Soccer now tracks SafeSport compliance directly in the Learning Center.

All Licensed Coaches must complete or link their annual SafeSport training.

Training is free and accessible at: learning.ussoccer.com/safesoccer

Coaches not in compliance by December 2025 will have their license marked as "Suspended" until training is completed.

FAQs

Did the SafeSport requirement for participants change?

No, there is no change to SafeSport or participation requirements. Just the tracking.

What about coaches that are not licensed that are required to complete SafeSport Training?

Your organization must track for all participants. This can be tracked through:

- SafeSport in the Learning Center
- SafeSport in the Learning Center downloaded into your registration system via API
- Your own system

Soccer At Schools Starter Toolkit



BEFORE STARTING A SCHOOLS PROGRAM; ASSESS YOUR READINESS

Before starting a school partnership, ask: What are our capacity, the school community we serve? Use these questions and if/then examples to guide you.

1. SCHOOL READINESS & ALIGNMENT

- Is school leadership (principal, PE teacher, after-school staff) supportive?
- Does the program align with school goals (wellness, SEL, enrichment)?
- Which grade-level groups will benefit?

If the school is trying new ideas → start with a festival or field day.
If the school wants involvement tied to PE or after-school → consider a short series or afterschool program.

2. STAFF & TIME CAPACITY

- Do we have coaches, coaches-in-relation during school or after-school?
- Can they arrive before dismissal or after school?
- Are we ready for a one-time event, short duration program, or ongoing program?

If you have low capacity → begin with in-class or single-day events.
If you have higher capacity and consistent weekly → include after-school clubs or afterschool programs.

The best point of entry depends on your goal:

- PE Teacher: Strong likelihood of student physical activity; often the decision-maker in activities contained in school physical activity.
- School PE Staff: Safe school practices; may need to appear on school partner list.
- District Health/PE Coordinator: Good for scaling beyond one school; oversees multiple facilities; district-wide initiatives.

Recommended Approaches:

- Search for an "ambassador": Check with staff and families in your club to see who the school can help or have connections to a specific school.
- Start with the PE teacher at a school to build rapport and learn about the school's needs.
- Make sure to play the program on weekends or keep it in the principal as they're informed.
- If you want to make it (multiple schools or district support), follow up with the district coordinator after getting or testing at one site.

GREATER GOALS, CHARLOTTE, NC

BUILDING LITERACY THROUGH SOCCER

The program worked with 45 Charlotte-Mecklenburg (CM) Title I public elementary schools in Charlotte, North Carolina. There were an average of 450 students per school where the program served 30 students per school in K-2 and 3-5 grade.

BACKGROUND & CONTEXT

Schools were Title I, serving low-income, largely immigrant populations. Many students had limited language fluency and communication/reading proficiency, low teacher rates, and/or uncharacteristic after-school participation. Reading on a grade level by 3rd grade was critical predictor of high school graduation and CPE literacy was needed to improve Charlotte's ranked last among the 50 largest U.S. cities in upward mobility.

WHAT YOU NEED:

- 1 soccer ball per student, cones for boundaries, paired cones as gates placed throughout the area.

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

Cones are set up in pairs around the space to form gates. Students try to dribble through the gates in 30 seconds, counting down or silently. After each round, students share about their previous attempt. If through variations like stopping the ball in the gates, putting changing direction.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

Encourage dribbling with heads up to avoid tripping and gates apart to reduce congestion.

SKILLS APPLIED:

- Self-Management: Calming down after frustration, trying again.
- Responsible Decision-Making: Making safe choices, following directions.
- Physical Skills: Dribbling, changing of direction, passing.

Kindergarten GATE DRIBBLING

WHAT YOU NEED:

- 1 soccer ball per student, cones for boundaries, paired cones as gates placed throughout the area.

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

Cones are set up in pairs around the space to form gates. Students try to dribble through the gates in 30 seconds, counting down or silently. After each round, students share about their previous attempt. If through variations like stopping the ball in the gates, putting changing direction.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

Encourage dribbling with heads up to avoid tripping and gates apart to reduce congestion.

SKILLS APPLIED:

- Self-Management: Calming down after frustration, trying again.
- Responsible Decision-Making: Making safe choices, following directions.
- Physical Skills: Dribbling, changing of direction, passing.

Grade Levels: 1st-5th Grade SPIDER WEBS

WHAT YOU NEED:

- 1 soccer ball per student, cones to mark boundaries.

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

All students start at dribbling with their web ball. Two students are chosen as spider gophers by passing their ball to another student's ball. If successful, that spider gopher continues until all players are part of the spider web. Encourage creative dribbling and pass.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

Ensure students aim for control, not power; monitor size.

SKILLS APPLIED:

- Self-Awareness: Recognizing how competitive play affects others.
- Self-Management: Regulating reactions when tapped or when missing a target.
- Social Awareness: Including others and adapting strategy.
- Relationship Skills: Playing cooperatively, resolving nagging questions.
- Responsible Decision-Making: Making safe choices, following directions.
- Physical Skills: Dribbling, passing, coordination.

Kindergarten BODY PART DRIBBLING

WHAT YOU NEED:

- 1 soccer ball per student, cones to define boundaries, different color cones throughout space (optional).

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

Before playing, students transform and pretend to work on body parts (e.g., knees, elbows, thumbs). As students dribble, the leader calls out a body part, and students must stop their ball using that body part. Play several rounds. Encourage students to control the ball by using softer touches and feet. Challenge students to find a cone and stop the ball with the named body part. Encourage creativity and laughter while maintaining control.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

On hard surfaces, vented students to dribble with small, controlled touches.

SKILLS APPLIED:

- Self-Awareness: Recognizing body parts.
- Self-Management: Following directions, maintaining control.
- Responsible Decision-Making: Responding safely to cues.
- Physical Skills: Coordination, ball control.

When
